Yes, It Was Possible!

It gives me great pleasure to announce that District 28 has been named a DISTINGUISHED DISTRICT for 2006-2007, making it four years in a row having earned this award.

Initial end-of-year reports on the Toastmasters International website (toastmasters.org/dpr) showed us just five member payments short of our goal. However, it turned out that one of our clubs had submitted exactly five new member payments in early June. Due to a minor paperwork error, those new members were not processed for several weeks. After a few phone calls, World Headquarters cleared the issues and recognized our five new members, ending the year exactly on target for membership payments!

I am extremely proud of the District Executive Committee and the Leadership Team. If you looked back at the numbers in February, it would have seemed impossible to get even close to goal. We made up substantial ground in member payments during the final two months of the year. At the end of April, we were 474 member payments shy. By the end of May, we shaved that to 277 member payments, and in June, we added exactly that number. THAT'S INCREDIBLE! Everyone one who helped in this effort should take pride. Thank you to all of the clubs that added members during those last two months of the year.

Among some of the other highlights of this year:

• Added 7 new clubs to the district, rising to the 100 active clubs mark for the first time in history and surpassing our goal by 3 clubs

- 181 members earned a Competent Communicator Award, surpassing our goal by 46
- 74 members earned an Advanced Communicator Award, exceeding goal by 36
- 99 members achieved either a Leadership award or DTM, thereby earning the District the maximum number of points in this category, exceeding last year's numbers
- 18 out of 23 Areas achieve Distinguished or better status (78%) compared to 16 Distinguished Areas a year ago
- 5 out of 7 Divisions achieve Select Distinguished or better status (71%)
- 47 clubs achieved Distinguished status or better (50%), compared to 46 a year ago
- Improved speech contest quality by creating the position of District Chief Judge and held judges training at all major District events
- Held a joint event with National Speakers Association of Michigan
- Created the position of Corporate Club Hunter, designed to improve our marketing efforts to companies within our District
- Overwhelming response to the District Open House Contest

We had an outstanding year and I am proud of everyone who assisted in this effort. We did it ethically, honestly, and with integrity. The groundwork we laid this year will bear additional fruit next year and for years to come.

Congratulations, District 28. Yes, It WAS Possible, and WE DID IT!


Area Governor Visits Underway



Toastmasters from many clubs, including Birmingham Toastmasters, Ford Toastmasters and Tier 1 Talkers, attended.

For those of you who missed this educational evening, here are a few "tips from Cliff."

- Volunteer, volunteer, volunteer. Table Topics is like anything else – the more you practice the better you become. As the saying goes, feel the fear and do it anyway.
- What's Your Point? Think first about the main point you want to leave your audience with.
 That is your conclusion. Keeping that in mind as you formulate your opening and the subpoints leading to your conclusion should make speaking easier.
- Have your Table Topic response evaluated. During a break or after the meeting ask your

- fellow Toastmasters for feedback on the flow and content of your response. Just as for speeches, constructive feedback will help you improve your gestures, eye contact and vocabulary, ultimately improving your response.
- Become involved in contests! Show what your Toastmasters training has done for you. It's a personal challenge and a lot of fun.

Having a Table Topics workshop was one of the best things we have done for our members. In speaking with those who attended afterwards, they agreed!

Toastmasters experience, are much greater if your officers are trained. PLEASE don't let these opportunities to learn and to improve your leadership skills go to waste! Additional make-up training sessions are being planned by some Division Governors, and will be announced on the District web site and by e-mail to the club Presidents.

The next round of training will be held in January-February 2008. (The dates and locations will be announced well in advance.) These sessions will cover different topics than the summer training, so <u>please</u> plan to attend one of the winter sessions!

How Do I "Look" For My Radio Interview?

The organization where I work, the Father Solanus Guild, recently hosted a play called "Solanus" about the life of Fr. Solanus Casey. One of my goals as the event coordinator was to work toward free advertising. Among our supporters was Teresa Tomeo, formerly of WKBD-TV 50 and ABC (Channel 7). Rather than a free announcement, Teresa asked if she could interview me. She would call me at home to chat about the event while broadcasting on the air. I was so excited! I planned and rehearsed my lines like any Toastmaster. ready...or at least I thought so. On the morning of the interview I started clearing my throat and developing other nervous habits that I don't usually experience before a speech. What was missing? The audience! The unseen radio listeners gave me no pre-speech words of encouragement. They wouldn't be available afterward to give me feedback. I was alone in my home office. Finally, the phone rang. It was the production manager to get me started. When Teresa came on the line, she put me at ease right away with her sweet and casual demeanor. "How do I look?" I joked. She immediately responded, "You look great!"

Soon we were live on the air in front of the invisible audience. None of Teresa's questions fit the way I had practiced the answers. Suddenly I was in the middle of the most nerve-wracking Table Topic of my Toastmaster's career. I felt like I was stumbling, hesitating, and grasping for words. My arm ached from gripping the phone! I thought to myself, "What am I saying? This is coming out all wrong! Where am I going with this and how will I wrap it up?" Later, I listened to the playback on the website which relieved my fears. In the end, my message was clear and purposeful. My confidence was intact once again.

This interview qualified as the Ice Breaker speech toward my next Competent Communicator (CC) Award. In this real-life situation my boss is the evaluator that mattered most. He was pleased with my performance.

I made my radio debut in the second hour. If you want to scroll ahead, I appear about halfway through. So tell me... how did I look?

I've Got a Secret

Would you like opportunities for leadership, personal growth, expanding your professional network, and experiences you'll never forget? Would you like to be part of an organization that has members in almost every country in the world?

If after reading this, you think this might be the newest "direct marketing" program that is going to change your life, you're wrong. It is Toastmasters International and this is my story.

One resident voiced her concerns to a representative of the county then turned her guns on me. Not only did she attack my work but she personally attacked me. I felt my heart begin pumping. I was approaching the "fight or flight" stage. It was then that I thought to myself that I've been here before. It reminded me of how I feel during table topics in my Toastmaster meetings. Immediately I was able to calm my heart rate and mind. I was in control thanks to my Toastmasters training. After speaking to her in a calm voice and showing that I was willing to listen, she actually began to calm down. She still wasn't happy about the project but at least we were able to talk like adults.

Here's my not so secret "secret". Like most things, Toastmasters is what you put into it. If you want to achieve leadership opportunities they are there for you. If you want to become a better speaker this is a place for you. If you want to exercise your "on the spot" thinking Toastmasters can help with that, too. Find a club, join a club and in no time you'll be speaking with confidence -- even in the most hostile environments!

The River of Life... Takes Me to Rochester, New York

Life teaches us many lessons. One I recently experienced was "Expect the unexpected."

This realization came when my speech for the Toastmasters International Speech Contest, "The River of Life," carried me through the Club, Area, Division and District competitions to the regional contest in Rochester, New York.

One of the central themes from that speech was life is like a river -- you never know what lies just around the next bend. Little did I know how appropriate this theme would be to this year's competition. Each phase of the competition, a new bend in the river, yielding a new and wonderful lesson.

When I joined Toastmasters in 2001, I was simply looking for a "hobby." I had no idea I would be able to develop the skills needed to win at the District level and go onto Regional.

Here are a few personal life lessons from this wonderful trip:

First, the system works! Go back to the basic manual, study the principles in the first ten speeches required to attain a CC. All of the disciplines needed to win at almost any level are in this well thought out manual.

Second, listen to your elders! That is, take the advice of Toastmasters who have experienced competing. After winning the Club competition in 2003, 2004 and 2006 and then bombing at the Area and Division level, I was fortunate enough to have a couple of "senior" Toastmasters take me aside and gently inform me what judges look for in a contest speech. I changed my style, and as they say, the rest is history.

Third, it is never too late to start. At the somewhat advanced age of 50 something ... I thought I had experienced just about every unexpected thrill possible; baseball titles, college graduations, skydiving, children; but the elation of hearing my name called as the International Speech Contest winner at District was unremarkable! The dinner

following the announcement was as fun-filled an event as I can remember. It was my 15 minutes of fame

Fourth, embrace Toastmaster diversity. During the six weeks between the District and Regional competition, I was fortunate enough to visit twelve different Toastmaster clubs to "vet" my speech. Club sizes ranged from six members up to thirty; from Troy to Toledo; Birmingham to Detroit; advanced to brand new – all with the same basic Toastmaster spirit, yet all unique. My only regret was that I waited so long to use the Regional speech preparation as motivation to experience this wonderful diversity.

I plan to continue my exploration of different clubs. My advice for those who might not have ventured out from their home clubs is hit the road! Marvel at the level of talent this District has.

Fifth, gratitude. To the numerous Toastmasters who invited me to their various clubs allowing me to get all the preparatory "stage time" I could possibly desire. Many of the suggestions from the evaluations were used to modify my speech, making it better and with a stronger message.

Finally, and probably the most important life lesson, be humble. As I mentioned earlier, District 28 produces dozens of speakers capable of winning the next District speech contest. I came out of nowhere to win this competition and there are many others capable of doing the same next year.

I was able to see many of these speakers perform at the various clubs I visited as I prepared for my Regional competition. As I sat and watched numerous speakers at these clubs I often found myself thinking, "Good grief, here is a finalist for next year's contest." It was during this phase of my preparation that I realized how fortunate I was to be representing D28 in the Regional. Be proud, but humble. Realize this is an experience that there is no guarantee of acquiring again.

Having said that, I still hope to make it to Montreal next year for the Region VI competition.

Public Speaking, Private Thoughts

It's your turn to speak. The Toastmaster begins to read your introduction. Then it starts, the conversation you have with yourself – questioning your skills as a public speaker. You're thinking, "What am I doing here? I'm going to make a mistake. I'm going to forget what to say." The list goes on. This internal dialogue is often referred to as self-talk, and more often than not, it is negative.

We all know that public speaking is not an easy task for most. In fact, it is one of the most feared social situations. Based on this, it is particularly susceptible to negative self-talk, especially directly before and after you speak. In preparation for this article, I conducted an unofficial survey of Toastmasters and non-Toastmasters to find out the kind of things they tell themselves about their public speaking ability. As I suspected, the vast majority admitted to negative thoughts similar to those listed above. Of the 20 people surveyed, only two spoke positively to themselves before speeches and presentations.

Self-talk is powerful! It confirms what we believe about our abilities as well as our potential successes or failures. What we tell ourselves about our public speaking ability is generally what we believe. If we believe we cannot deliver a successful speech, we probably can't...and won't. Henry Ford said, "If you think you can or think you can't, you're right." The Bible says, "For as he thinketh in his heart, so is he."

Research also confirms the relationship between our thoughts and our performance. Psychologist, Albert Bandura, conducted extensive research on self-efficacy, an individual's belief that he or she is capable of performing a specific task. Those with high self-efficacy tend to approach tasks as challenges to be mastered rather than threats to be avoided. Successful prior experience is the most effective way to increase self-efficacy. Toastmasters provides the opportunity for many public speaking successes.

The first and most important step in combating negative self-talk is self-awareness. If you don't realize you are engaging in negative self-talk, you will not be able to put an end to it. Once you identify the negative self-talk, replace it with positive statements about your public speaking ability. These positive statements are referred to as positive affirmations. Positive affirmations are simply the opposite of negative self-talk. It may seem silly at first, but you might be surprised how quickly you begin to believe you can present a successful speech. For example, tell yourself, "I enjoy public speaking. I am an accomplished speaker and every time I speak I get better and better."

It is ironic how supportive and encouraging we are of our fellow Toastmasters, yet we don't give ourselves the same consideration. As Toastmasters we have taken a significant step toward improving our public speaking skills. Let's give ourselves credit and think positive!

As soon as I came home, I phoned my siblings in Boston and Korea, crying and sharing my joy and pride with my five brothers and sister because I took my first step toward overcoming my fear of public speaking. Since joining Motor City Speak Easy, I have served as Club Treasurer, Secretary, and VP-Membership.

In August 2004, I joined my second Toastmasters club, Saturday Sunrisers because I wanted to use Saturday mornings in a constructive manner. You see, I used to call my only sister at 8 a.m. every Saturday until her death in July 2004. I was having a tough time dealing with my loss, but rather than crying my Saturday mornings away, I decided to use those painful mornings to further improve my communication and leadership skills. I am sure that's what my sister would have wanted me to do. My friends Saturday Sunrisers not only helped me deal with my loss better but also provided me with opportunities to learn and grow. I really enjoyed serving as VP-Education under Tho

Diep's leadership for 2005-2006. Tho Diep has been my mentor and one of the best club presidents I ever met. He never ceases to amaze me with his communication and leadership skills and also his display of unwavering commitment and professionalism. He was the one who encouraged me to serve as a district officer.


